Prevention of Dengue

<u>Indore, 29 Feb.</u>:- The dengue awareness camp was organized in Alps International School, Indore with the aim of raising awareness about the deadly disease, dengue and its prevention. In the camp, healthcare professionals, community leaders, and volunteers were demonstrating the causes, sources, symptoms and preventive ways of dengue to the students and teachers.

The activities included in camp as group discussions, distribution of informational materials, and practical demonstrations by exhibitions on how to prevent dengue transmission. - (i) In the story 'Lost Spring' Saheb, on one hand, has lost his freedom and chooses a life of responsibility, poverty, and exploitation. While Mukesh, on the other hand, dreams to break out of the circle of poverty and wants to become a car mechanic one day. He is ambitious and is even willing to walk all the way to the garage to achieve his dream.
- (ii) Office bearers are expected to be hard working like Kothamanglam Subbu. The person must be multi-tasking like Subbu. He was always ready with fourteen alternatives of a shot and turned his entire creativity to the advantage of his boss. He never aspired to the lead roles but whatever subsidiary role he played in any of the films, he performed better than the supposed main players. Like Subbu, an office bearer shouldn't aspire for any position and whatever work profile is assigned should be done with dedication, marvelous skill and performance
- (iii) Umberto Eco was a regular academic scholar. Since he was pursuing scholarly pursuits through academic writings in a narrative way up-to the age of 50, he wrote about forty non-fictional writings. But he realised that he shouldn't feel the frustration for not do fictional writing like his friend Ronald Barthes and novels satisfied his taste of narrative. So he started writing novels by accident.
- (iv) The lesson gives us an autobiographical account of William Douglas, the process of overcoming fear after three failures. We should believe that failure is a part of life. Sometimes, we get knocked down by life, but how we react, matters.
 In every process of reaching up-to a goal, we encounter challenges. Sometimes, not all challenges lead to success, but when we accept failure as part of the process, we will be encouraged never to give up. Besides, a back-up plan always supports us and doesn't let us be depressed by any failure.
- (v) The poem My Mother at Sixty Six gives a subtle message that ups and downs are essential part of life. In the vehicle when the poet notices her mother's opened mouth which gives her a glimpse like dead body, she became gloomy. But when she looks out the vehicle she sees that young trees were sprinting, overjoyed children were there. Still, at airport she remembers her childhood's fear of separation from her mother. She was sad and upset yet she has to smile to make feel her mother a hope. Above mentioned things show that ups and downs are part of life one shouldn't worry about it.

- (vi) Frost is upset with the attitude of urban people for rural people. He says that thousands of selfish cars pass in front of the roadside stand but not a single one stops to buy their products. The situation shows despondency for the poor rural folk. He pleads to urban people for help and support to these rural people. He says that if ever a car stops it is only to enquire about the farmer's price or to use his yard to back and turn around. One of the cars stops for a gallon of gas. This demonstrates the sense of alienation of urban people towards the rural people.

The Maharaja insisted on restricting tiger-killing in his state. He did not allow the British officer for tiger hunting, even refused to take photograph with dead tiger. He had to send a gift of fifty diamond rings to the British officer's good lady to placate the injured feelings of the man and to retain his kingdom. It illustrates that he was penny-wise, pound foolish.

Bama's experience of caste discrimination as a child when Annan described her about it would have played a pivotal role in making her a strong and resilient Tamil Dalit feminist, teacher, novelist and author as she is today.

(A) The peddler's actions in relation to the crofter and Edla highlight the complexities of human behaviour and the transformative power of kindness. While the peddler initially approaches the crofter with dishonest intentions, trying to deceive him, the crofter shows kindness by offering him shelter and treating him with compassion. However, the peddler steals the crofter's money and escapes, demonstrating that his initial experiences of kindness did not lead to a transformation in his behaviour.

On the other hand, when the peddler encounters Edla, she treats him with genuine kindness and offers him a safe haven. She shows trust in him and believes in his potential for goodness. This act of kindness has a profound impact on the peddler, leading to a change in his attitude and actions. He feels remorse for his past behaviour and decides to return the stolen money.

This suggests that while kindness has the potential to transform people, the conditions for receiving that kindness are crucial. Edla's unconditional kindness, trust, and belief in the peddler's goodness create an environment where he feels genuinely valued and worthy of redemption. In contrast, the crofter's kindness, although well-intentioned, is not enough to evoke a lasting change in the peddler.

- (B) Pablo Neruda imagines a beautiful world in which silence and stillness with deep pondering of one's activities becomes a regular part of his/her life and which increases understanding of oneself and reduces environmental conflict and war. Neruda's vision can be adopted into a social, political and cultural context in the following ways.
 - The first is Neruda's suggestion of keeping quiet can be adopted into the social context of a school curriculum. Students can devote 30 minutes of silence in a week after prayer as meditation activity to introspect or review their whole week's activities or in a library. They would be taught to be still and silent and to review their actions and to prepare future planning.
 - Second, Neruda's suggestion of stillness can be suggested to political parties who can incorporate
 them into their political doctrine. They can stop allegations on each-others and should focus on
 their acts.
 - Third, at a cultural level of mutual understanding for can be adopted at a grassroots level movement starting with Stillness Clubs (where people go to stay still and be silent) for the public which can then be replicated in companies and neighbourhoods.
 Ideally, stillness and silence should be taught at home and from there, it should spread all over the world.



 - While the story 'Memories of Childhood part II We too are Human Beings' exposes the bitter truth of ancient landlord's system they exploit the marginalised people. Sometimes they take hard work from poor people and don't pay for that because they consider that 'beggar' work without payment. Sometimes these hard working people appear ridiculous in showing excessive respect to these landlords. Hence the past ruling system is condemned in these stories.

(B) As a character of Sam, I would initially express scepticism and doubt about Charley's belief that the third level of the Grand Central Station is in existence. I would diagnose that Charley has considered third level as a portal to the past and his escape from fear, war, worry, stress, and insecurity of the modern world.
